A Message From The Rev. Jim Barnes, National Minister

There's a story told of a world famous jewel merchant. One day he watched one of his salesmen show a beautiful diamond to a rich shopper. The customer listened thoughtfully to the expert description, but eventually turned away, saying, "It's a wonderful stone, but not exactly what I want."

The famous jewel merchant stopped the customer on his way out and asked, "Do you mind if I show you that diamond once more?" The man agreed. The owner took the stone in his hand. He did not repeat anything the salesman had said. He simply talked about the gem as an object of deep beauty. Abruptly the customer changed his mind and bought the diamond. While he was waiting for it to be brought to him, he turned to the jewel merchant and said, "Why did I buy it willingly from you, though I had no difficulty saying no to your salesman?"

The owner answered, "That salesman is one of the best men in the business. **He** *knows* **diamonds but** I *love* **them.**"

A similar principle applies to our relationship with Jesus.

If we as Christians hope to share the Good News of Jesus with an uninterested and unbelieving world, the first step involves looking into our own hearts and asking the question: **Do I simply** *know about* **Jesus or do I really** *love* **Him**?

As a pastor, I have spent years challenging Christians to share their faith with others so that people might come to the knowledge of who Jesus is and what He has done for them and be saved. But no matter how much any of us are challenged to go out

U.C.C. Files Lawsuit Challenging North Carolina Marriage Law

According to their own website (ucc.org), the United Church of Christ "filed a landmark lawsuit in U.S. District Court on Monday, April 28, 2014, arguing that North Carolina marriage laws restrict freedom of religion." The U.C.C. is the lead plaintiff in the case and is a Protestant denomination with 5,154 congregations nationwide and 155 churches in the state of North Carolina.

In 2012, North Carolina voters approved Amendment One, which essentially defined marriage as the union of one man and one woman. The U.C.C. is arguing that North Carolina marriage laws limit ministers' choices, violate the principle of "free exercise of religion" upon which the church is built, and restrict the freedoms of religion and expressive association guaranteed in the First Amendment.

This example of yet another assault on marriage being waged in the judicial system, now by an entire denomination, serves as a reminder of why the Evangelical Association continues to affirm the biblical guidelines for human sexuality: marriage as the union of one man and one woman, fidelity and holiness in marriage and chastity outside of marriage for the sake of the Kingdom. Please be in prayer for all believers in the Evangelical, Reformed, Congregational and Christian churches whose congregations are now implicated as being supportive of this lawsuit because of their association with the U.C.C. denomination.

While all those things may seem important, ultimately, the success of a church is measured primarily by discovering if the people who are a part of the church are loving Jesus and letting Jesus love them.

God Kept Turning Him Back to the Ministry

The Rev. Greg Way-Friedens Reformed Church, Tripp, South Dakota



Greg Way grew up as a church going guy. As a young man in college in the 1970's, he was majoring in African Studies and had plans to move overseas to be a missionary. Two of his professors who were from Africa suggested that he might be better suited to be a minister here in the United States, so he headed off to seminary.

It turns out the seminary he chose was a Methodist school which Greg says ran him through the "buzz saw" of liberal theology. During seminary and after, Pastor Greg served several Methodist congregations over a period of a few years and decided that ministry was not for him.

For the next ten years, Greg had a variety of secular jobs ending with a four year stint in the Infantry. "You don't realize how hard it is to join the Infantry at age

33 until you start going through training with a bunch of guys who are 18-19 years old!" says Greg Way reflecting back on his decision.

Although he spent a decade away from active ministry, the Lord kept working on him until finally Greg real-

ized that even away from the church, he was still "ministering" to the people with whom he was working. Upon his release from the military, Greg enrolled in the University of Dubuque Theological Seminary where he says he was taught solid, biblical theology and where his commitment to the Lord was finally made firm.

He then returned to the ministry, serving a series of UCC congregations in upstate New York and Illinois, finally arriving at a church in South Dakota in 1993. In 2000 he was called as the pastor of Friedens UCC in Tripp, South Dakota as the first non-German speaking pastor in the church's history.

Friedens Reformed Church was founded in 1901 in Tripp which had a large German population and many small German speaking country



churches. Over time, several of these smaller congregations folded and merged with Friedens. Like many German Reformed churches, Friedens joined the Evangelical and Reformed denomination and later the UCC.

In 2005, the people of Friedens drafted a resolution defining marriage as the union of one man and one woman (as recognized by South Dakota law) and decided to take it to the UCC conference meeting in Rapid City. Thinking it would be an easy resolution to pass, the delegates from Friedens were surprised to find that their resolution was anything but non-controversial at the meeting of the UCC. According to Pastor Way, the people from Friedens were treated very badly at the conference meeting by those in opposition to their resolution.

Following this event, Friedens UCC began discussions regarding their affiliation with the denomination. According to Pastor Way, a UCC official came to one of their meetings and told the congregation that the Bible was a book of "myth, fairy tale and legend." Shortly thereafter the members of the church voted to depart from the denomination which they determined no longer reflected their theological beliefs.

Since their departure from the UCC, things have been going well at Friedens with the church experiencing health and vitality. In 2007, both Pastor Greg and the congregation joined the Evangelical Association.

Just recently, the people of Friedens, in partnership with the Lutheran church in town, rented out the local

theater to show the film "God is Not Dead." In a rural town with a population of about 500 people, Pastor Way says, "We filled the local theater (which seats about 300) to overflowing four times over the course of the weekend. People came from neighboring towns and I can say I haven't seen that many people in Tripp all at the same time in years!"

Pastor Way says, "God brought me into ministry sort of like He did Jonah. I kept running away, but He kept bringing me back."

From Selling Groceries to Making Disciples

Pastor Calvin L. Covington—True Worship Christian Church, Burlington, North Carolina



As a young man in the mid 1980's, C.L. Covington had started a promising career in the grocery business. He had risen to the rank of co-manager and was on track to be manager of his own store. The Lord, however, had other plans.

According to C.L., "I had grown up attending church, but in 1988 the Lord began dealing with my heart and letting me know I needed to be saved." This realization led him to make a decision to be baptized. Shortly thereafter he was invited by a cousin to visit the Green Level Christian Church where he began serving the Lord in various capacities.

As he continued to grow and mature in his faith under the leader-

ship of Senior Pastor Coslow Holt, C.L. was eventually licensed as a minister and sent out to serve as pastor of a church. "In order to accept the call to preach, I had to give up my career as a grocery store manager," states C.L. "I had a plan, but God had a detour."

After serving eight years at the Patilla Congregational Christian Church, God called C.L. to plant a new congregation, the True Worship Christian Church in 2012. As a part-time pastor, the Lord had provided a new job for C.L. that made his responsibilities as a pastor easier to accomplish. Working for Nabisco, he now sets up displays in grocery stores for Oreo cookies and Triscuit crackers. This allows him to work four days a week with Tuesdays, Saturdays and Sundays off.

The True Worship Christian Church just recently joined the Evangelical Association. According to Pastor C.L., "Our goal at True Worship is to preach the Word of God and have a church where we worship in one accord where discipleship is key and we can spread the Word of God in all areas of our lives."

The church is getting its start in a Methodist church building in Burlington, North Carolina. The members of the Methodist church who own the building have decided to share their facility with the new congregation of True Worship.

Recently the members of True Worship engaged in a "grocery outreach" into their community. The congregation purchased and donated groceries which they then bagged up and distributed to needy families. The former grocery store manager is now leading ministry efforts to provide food to those in need.
